The reaction portion of an anticipation-reaction guide activity requires students to come to final conclusions about what the text actually states as the answer to the questions provided on the anticipation-reaction guide. Students get to ask themselves questions such as, "Did I guess

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right?" "Was my initial guess confirmed?"
